Review of the business

The principal activity of the company during this year was the promotion of its automated telecommunications trading marketplace called Bank of Telecom® that has become a positive disruptor in the international telecommunications market. During the year the company was admitted as a full member into the Global Leadership Forum (GLF) the industry steering group of the 32 largest telecommunications carriers. In May 2022 Bank of Telecom® won the GCCM Global Telecoms Awards as the 'Best Telecoms Marketplace 2022' for the fourth year running.

The company revenues grew to £348m (2021: £206.8m). Bank of Telecom ® Members consist of Mobile Network Operators, Tier 1 and Tier 2 telecommunications operators and SMS Aggregators, around the world. Bank of Telecom® Members increased to 2,186 (2021: 1,584) and Revenue per employee (including contractors) increased to £6.9m (2021: £4.8m). Revenue per Member increased to £159,194 (2021: £130,681).

In July 2022, the company chose Investec Bank plc as its strategic debt partner closing a US\$20m loan facility, the proceeds of which were used to provide working capital to exploit new opportunities for growth and to refinance some existing borrowing. Further, on 30 September 2022, the company entered into a contract for differences (CFD) heading contract of £10m at a rate of 1.0863 for June 2023 There were no other significant post-balance sheet events.

The company can also report that its Chilean subsidiary Internet Mobile Communications Chile SpA posted 2022 revenues of £4.8m with EBITDA of £55k, these results are not consolidated into the financial results for the company. Further, we have appointed Kareen Goldfarb as General Manager who will be leading our full Chilean license application.

During the year the company continued to make progress in making the company equity investment or IPO ready by ensuring the development and adoption of the appropriate policies and procedures and the onboarding of its overseas staff to wholly owned subsidiaries and branches.

IMC India, IMC Armenia and IMC Guatemala are corporate cost centres employing staff promoting and supporting IMC and the Bank of Telecom® and do not make sales via the local entities.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Market and economic conditions

Market and economic conditions are recognised as one of the principal risks in the current trading environment. Risk is mitigated by the monitoring of trading conditions and changes in government legislation and global telecoms market conditions; the company is constantly searching for ways to achieve new efficiencies in the business without impacting service levels.

Competition

The company operates in a highly competitive marketplace and while the directors believe the company enjoys certain key strengths and advantages in competing for business, the company remains vigilant and monitors competitors' activity and constantly reviews its own services and prices to ensure a competitive position in the market is maintained.

Infrastructure failure

The directors believe that one of the key differentiators the company offers is that its services are managed through its own controlled and managed Bank of Telecom® marketplace and its 24x7x365 Network Operations Centre providing customers with comfort over the resilience and reliability. The company is exposed to risks of infrastructure failure; however, a critical element of our operating procedures is to mitigate such risks through the careful construction, maintenance, and management

plans.

S.172 Companies Act 2006: Statement of Directors' Duties to Stakeholders

The Board is mindful of the duties of directors under S.172 of the Companies Act 2006. We make use of in-house collaboration and communication tools to reduce the need for travel to meetings and operate flexible working practices where possible, reducing the environmental impact of commuting.

The company is a sponsor of DARWIN200 project which is training 200 young conservationists and inspiring global nature and conservation efforts, by re-tracing Charles Darwin's famous journey on HMS Beagle. Starting in 2023 they will undertake this epic journey, lasting 2 years, on a tall ship, creating the world's most exciting classroom.

Directors' Report

Year ended 30 June 2022

The directors present their report and the financial statements of the company for the year ended 30 June 2022.

Principal activities

The principal activity of the company during the year was the promotion of its automated marketplace for telecoms trade called Bank of Telecom®.

Bank of Telecom® offers an automated Voice and SMS trading solution and service to the international telecommunications market estimated to be worth US\$1.7 trillion and which is expected to expand at a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 5.4% through to 2028.

The company's immediately addressable market is the global telecom services market for voice and SMS services which was estimated to be valued at US\$200 billion in 2022.

The company now intends to embark on M&A activity in the coming year to further increase market share and shareholder value.

The Board would like to thank Wen Lei Sun for her 5 years of service as an IMC Director and are pleased she remains a Technical Director responsible for SMS Operations.

Dividends

Particulars of recommended dividends are detailed in note 13 to the financial statements.

Future developments

In July 2022, the company signed a facility agreement with Investec Bank plc, the proceeds of which were used to provide additional working capital and refinance existing borrowing. There were no other significant post-balance sheet events.

The company has begun the new financial year trading strongly; and the directors are looking forward to delivering significant year-on-year growth in revenues, EBITDA and profit.

In addition to its subsidiary undertakings, IMC Chile SPA and IMCBOT Communications India Private Limited ("IMC India"), detailed in note 16 to the financial statements, the company has a branch operation in Yerevan, Armenia from where the company manages some of its sales and marketing activities.

The company continues to invest resources in its research and development activities, and in doing so fully owns the intellectual property underpinning its proprietary platform and secondary systems, for example a customer relationship management solution which was authored entirely in-house.

Financial instruments

A key objective of the company is to manage financial risk, secure cost-effective funding where necessary and minimise adverse effects of fluctuations in the financial markets on the value of the company's financial assets and liabilities, on reported profitability and on cash flows.

The company's principal financial instruments for fundraising are short-term unsecured borrowings; in addition, the company has various other financial instruments such as cash, trade receivables and trade payables that arise directly from its operations.

The carrying amount of assets and liabilities is equivalent to their fair value.

Cash flow interest risk

The company pays interest on its borrowings.

The company has no borrowings at variable rates which would expose it to cash flow interest rate risk. Borrowings issued at fixed rates expose the company to fair value interest rate risk. The company does not use derivatives.

Price risk

The company is not exposed to significant commodity or security price risk.

Credit risk

Credit risk is managed at an operational level on a deal-by-deal basis. Credit risk arises from cash and cash equivalents as well as credit exposures to customers, including outstanding receivables. Individual risk limits are set based on internal and external ratings and reviewed by management. The utilisation of credit limits is regularly monitored with appropriate action taken by management in the event of the breach of a credit limit. The company has applied the simplified approach applying a a provision matrix based on number of days past due to measure lifetime expected credit losses and after considering customers with different credit risk profiles and current and forecast trading conditions.

The company has recognised a provision in respect of trade receivables of £209,540 (2021: £209,540).

Liquidity risk

Management reviews cash forecasts of the company and liquidity is managed by projecting cash flows and considering the level of liquid assets necessary to meet these forecasted requirements.

Foreign exchange risk

The company operates internationally and is exposed to foreign exchange risk, primarily the US dollar. Foreign exchange risk arises from future commercial transactions and recognised assets and liabilities denominated in a currency that is not the functional currency of the company.

The risk is not hedged, and exchange gains or losses are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income as a gain of £5,388,151 (2021: loss of £1,831,380).

Greenhouse gas emissions, energy consumption and energy efficiency

Greenhouse gas emissions, energy consumption and energy efficiency disclosures are not given because the company's annual energy consumption is under 40,000 kWh.

Directors' responsibilities statement

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 30 June 2022

1. General information

The company is a private company limited by shares, registered in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Hurst House, 131-133 New London Road, Chelmsford, CM2 0QT.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland'.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Consolidation

The entity has taken advantage of the exemption from preparing consolidated financial statements contained in Section 402 of the Companies Act 2006 on the basis that its subsidiaries are excluded from consolidation on the grounds that their inclusion is not material for the purpose of giving a true and fair view.

Revenue recognition

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for services rendered.

Revenue from the provision of airtime and SMS is recognised when it is matched with a supplier of the service, and the billing period occurs in the period of the financial statements.

Income tax

The taxation expense represents the aggregate amount of current and deferred tax recognised in the reporting period. Tax is recognised in profit or loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, tax is recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Current tax is recognised on taxable profit for the current and past periods. Current tax is measured at the amounts of tax expected to pay or recover using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Intangible assets

Trademarks and patents are recorded at cost and amortisation over five years.

Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful life of that asset as follows:

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Fixed asset investments are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated impairment losses.

Listed investments are measured at fair value with changes in fair value being recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

Finance leases and hire purchase contracts

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are recognised in the statement of financial position as assets and liabilities at the lower of the fair value of the assets and the present value of the minimum lease payments, which is determined at the inception of the lease term. Any initial direct costs of the lease are added to the amount recognised as an asset.

Lease payments are apportioned between the finance charges and reduction of the outstanding lease liability using the effective interest method. Finance charges are allocated to each period so as to produce a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

Government grants

Government grants are recognised at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the company will comply with the conditions attaching to them and the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognised using the accrual model.

Under the accrual model, government grants relating to revenue are recognised on a systematic basis over the periods in which the company recognises the related costs for which the grant is intended to compensate. Grants that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the entity with no future related costs are recognised in income in the period in which it becomes receivable.

Financial instruments

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the entity after deducting all of its financial liabilities.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as a finance cost in profit or loss in the period in which it arises.

Share-based payments

Equity-settled share-based payment transactions are measured at fair value at the date of grant. The fair value is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, with a corresponding increase in equity. This is based upon the company's estimate of the shares or share options that will eventually vest which takes into account all vesting conditions and non-market performance conditions, with adjustments being made where new information indicates the number of shares or share options expected to vest differs from previous estimates.

Fair value is determined using an appropriate pricing model. All market conditions and non-vesting conditions are taken into account when estimating the fair value of the shares or share options. As long as all other vesting conditions are satisfied, no adjustment is made irrespective of whether market or non-vesting conditions are met.

Where the terms of an equity-settled transaction are modified, an expense is recognised as if the terms had not been modified. In addition, an expense is recognised for any increase in the fair value of the transaction, as measured at the date of modification.

Where an equity-settled transaction is cancelled or settled, it is treated as if it had vested on the date of cancellation or settlement, and any expense not yet recognised in profit or loss is expensed immediately.

29. Contingencies

In the prior year the company introduced a long term incentive plan for non-UK employees and consultants. Under the plan the individuals concerned are allocated units which entitle them to a bonus based on the increase of the share price above the grant price. The bonus becomes payable either on exit (sale of the company) or on submission of a claim at a date between 30 June 2025 and 30 June 2030, whichever is the earlier. The bonus due may be settled in new shares in the company or in cash.

There are number of significant uncertainties affecting the amount of the bonus, including the share price at the time of payment, the date of payment and whether the individual is still providing services to the company at that time (no payment being due to individuals who are no longer providing services). Had a bonus been payable at 30 June 2022 the estimated bonus would have been £327,700 (2021: £170,500).

30. Related party transactions

At the year end the company owed directors £737,582 (2021: £529,182).

During the year the company charged interest of £166,052 (2021: £49,000) to the BoTCoin Holdings Limited group, over which one of the directors of Internet Mobile Communications Limited has significant control. At the year end, the BoTCoin Holdings Limited group owed the company £1,842,499 (2021: £937,461) by way of a loan, which is shown under other debtors.

Key management personnel include all persons that have authority and responsibility for planning, directing and controlling the activities of the company. The total compensation paid to key management personnel for services provided to the company was £508,148 (2021: £502,476).
